

ENGLAND NETBALL ANNUAL REPORT 2020-2021





COLIN POVEY, CHAIR

What a difference a year makes! 12 months ago, I was reflecting on a wave of positive, good news stories that had followed the Vitality Netball World Cup 2019 and we were fully expecting our sport to go from strength to strength. However, we were also just seeing the beginnings of the impact COVID-19 was having on society as a whole. Ultimately the virus stopped virtually all sports and sadly netball activities across both the elite and recreational game were suspended for much of the time covered by this annual report.

Whilst 2020 has seen the organisation challenged like never before we have also been reminded of just how passionate, resilient and dedicated the Netball Family is. I am incredibly proud of the way in which England Netball members of staff, led by CEO Fran Connolly, responded to the unprecedented circumstances. Endless hours were spent planning for a host of scenarios, liaising with Government, and keeping both members and volunteers updated as the pandemic evolved. Despite the distinct lack of action on the court we should be extremely proud of the way the wider Netball Family pulled together to protect our sport and keep each other safe.

Against a truly turbulent background it was a minor miracle that we managed to get the Vitality Roses to New Zealand for an international series towards the end of 2020. I am grateful for the support of both the UK and New Zealand Governments and for the commitment of all our travelling athletes who had to undergo rigorous testing and quarantine regimes. The series gave everyone associated with our sport a much needed boost when lockdown was restricting so many activities that we had previously taken for granted.

We were not so fortunate as we started 2021 when Jamaica had to pull out of their scheduled UK tour. However, with some innovative thinking; fantastic collaboration across many parts of the sport and another slug of good, old fashioned hard work we managed to put on a replacement series between the Vitality Roses and the Vitality Netball Legends. Again, thanks are due to all those who worked so hard to create this opportunity. Shortly afterwards the Vitality Netball Superleague itself was able to return, albeit in a modified format and using two central venues. In this context the work of Independent Chair of the VNSL board Steve Elworthy and his fellow board members has been particularly valuable to us this year. Sky Sports provided streaming services that meant every single game could be viewed live by fans and in the circumstances this latest season has been a remarkable success.

Of course, the pandemic had a significant impact on our finances as well as our normal operations. Income from ticket sales and membership subscriptions were understandably reduced by a significant amount but we are grateful that so many members opted still to pay their full fees whilst not really knowing just how much netball they would play. Several of our leading sponsors and commercial partners also stood firmly by our side and continued to work with us to find new ways in which we could deliver mutually beneficial activities despite COVID-19. In addition, the Executive Team worked hard to minimise discretionary spend and this resulted in an end of year financial result to be proud of.

We also owe thanks to Sport England for their continued belief in our plans. They have provided both moral and financial support as well as allowing us greater flexibility, in the short term, as to how we are permitted to use the funds they provide. Additional Government support via the furlough scheme and the Sports Winter Survival Package administered by the Department for Culture, Media and Sport have also been much appreciated. These funds have been deployed to protect the sport at all levels and with a view to us returning to normal as soon and as safely as possible.

After last year's virtual AGM I am hopeful we will be able to meet in person again this year. Behind the scenes your



new President, Joan Mills MBE, has certainly had a unique 'induction' to her new role but she is just as energetic and committed as her predecessor, Lindsay Sartori.

The Board has continued to work hard on governance matters and in January this year we welcomed Jennifer Thomas as a new Co-Opted Director to assist with our work on inclusion and diversity. David Armstrong was appointed in July 2020 and brings a wealth of financial, commercial experience and a background in other sports. Fran has continued to develop her Executive leadership team and I am confident we have an effective team overseeing matters at both an executive and non-executive level. We are refining a new 'adventure strategy' for the sport which we hope will keep us ahead of the pack and as we move into the second half of 2021, we are working on succession plans for my own role and that of other senior directors as they approach the end of their maximum terms of office.

On all fronts the sport remains well set to pick up the pace again as the restrictions imposed by the pandemic start to ease. In addition, we will have a home Commonwealth Games to look forward to in 2022.

I hope the whole Netball Family will once again be able to come together and enjoy happier times but for now thank you once again for your support over the last 12 months.

This year has truly been like no other. We've faced many unexpected challenges, but I am so proud of all that we have achieved in the last 12 months. It has been an honour to see everyone's hard work, determination and collaborative thinking help to unite the netball community and ensure our sport didn't lose the momentum it was enjoying prior to COVID-19.

Despite having to navigate through the rapidly changing tides of the pandemic, we saw teammates fundraise for those working on the front line, athletes go above and beyond to ensure we could enjoy some elite netball on our screens, volunteers dedicate endless hours to return the game and netballers the length and breadth of the country come together to protect the sport despite all the uncertainty we were faced with.

It's remarkable how much impact we've been able to have despite a lot of netball activity being suspended. This year we've had to take a lot of things online due to the Government imposed lockdowns. First with the introduction of our new 'Virtual Netball Club' which brought our members closer to the game with online workouts, never seen before interviews and fun challenges, then through engaging Bee@Home resources, health and wellbeing webinars, virtual awards ceremonies, plus so much more. Our content and connection with the wider Netball Family has continued to go from strength to strength throughout this period, which has been a delight to see.

As ever, it's extremely important to us to keep women and girls active and connected to our sport, so getting members back on court this last year has been a huge focus and challenge. It involved a huge effort, supported by the global netball family, with extensive game analysis, rule modifications, safety protocols being implemented, the introduction of COVID-19 Officers and so much more. I cannot thank our friends in Australia, New Zealand, Isle of Man, Ireland and Guernsey enough for their support with trialling rule modifications whilst here in England restrictions were prohibitive. All the necessary steps were taken at all levels of the sport to ensure a safe and Government approved return – it's been an unexpected journey getting here but it is incredible how much detail, thought and time went in to getting people back playing the sport we love.

We know this has been a hard year for everyone, however when I look back on all that we have achieved together, from 75% of the Netball Family standing beside us during a pandemic through the #RiseAgain campaign, reactivating international and Vitality Netball Superleague games with more visibility and views than ever before, as well returning the grassroots game to communities across the country in such uncertain times, I feel truly overwhelmed by the strength of the netball community.

It is a delight to see netballers everywhere jumping at the chance to get back on court now and their return is all thanks to the many volunteers who have worked tirelessly to safety return the action. We expect this to be one of the biggest summers of netball yet at a community level. I cannot wait to see what the next year holds... gold medal!

To wrap things up I just want to say a huge thank you to our staff, Board, members, volunteers, officials, coaches, athletes, partners, Vitality Netball Superleague and grassroots clubs, and everyone who has helped us to get to where we are today and stood by us - all of this wouldn't have been possible without everyone uniting for the sport. I can't wait to work with you all again on this exciting next chapter.



THE UNKNOWN

This year has been unlike any other. After COVID-19 spread across the country, we, like all sports, had to halt all activity from grassroots to elite level as the first Government lockdown was implemented. In April, the Prime Minister announced an extension to the lockdown, and it started to become clear that 'normality' wouldn't be returning any time soon.

Being faced with an uncertain future, scores of members and fans missing their netball, and limited opportunities for the public to get active, we started to consider how we could take things online and keep people connected to our sport.

Our initial response was creating the galvanizing 'Virtual Netball Club' (VNC); a member only space which gives people access to a range of exciting opportunities and content, from live workouts with big netball stars to unseen Vitality Roses interviews and coaching tips. With a weekly schedule of new engaging content, this new channel empowered members to be healthier and happier off the court and brought members closer to the sport than ever before.

The VNC was a resounding success in all aspects and a real team effort, with the Vitality Roses leading workouts and sharing their insight in Netball Natter interviews, expert coaches giving in depth advice and support to others, England Netball Ambassador Sasha Corbin inspiring junior netballers through weekly training sessions, and partners providing exciting challenges and recipes for healthy eating, plus so much more.

The engagement on social media and the viewing numbers spoke for themselves.

What started out as an idea to keep members occupied and engaged with netball for what we thought would just be a few weeks of lockdown, turned into a year-long project. The VNC, continuously evolved with the development of an inspiring brand and content designed to meet the needs of the nation through the changing tides of the pandemic. We hope our members will continue to enjoy consuming and engaging with our sport through this new member benefit going forwards.

The VNC sessions have engaged the netball community and fed our passion.


So, in May we launched our 'Any Dream We'll Do'

One being the cancellation of several competitions towards the end of the 2019/20 netball calendar, including the 2020 Vitality Netball Superleague season. It had started with a bang; arenas were sold out, all eyes were on the game, and a new team (Leeds Rhinos) had been announced to be joining the league in 2021. There was so much to look forward to, but our hopes for finishing the season came to a halt at the end of May when we were forced to confirm that the 2020 season would not be completed as a result of the pandemic.















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NETBALL AGAINST RACISM

On 25 May, the shocking death of George Floyd saw the global news agenda shift to the subject of racism. As an organisation we knew we needed to do more to support Black members of the Netball Family and stand together against racism. We were contacted by many incredible women in our sport at this time about the need for us to be part of the change, and we whole heartedly agreed.

As an initial, but vital step, we began running 'Here to Listen' forums for the Netball Family to come together and further explore the experiences of Black and ethnically diverse communities in our sport. We had so many inspiring open and honest discussions and as a result could start to make critical changes across our game.

Since this, we have reenergised our intent and action around all areas of inclusion in our sport as we are committed to ensuring that netball is a place where everyone can belong and thrive.

In June, we were delighted to be a part of a collaborative action of organisations coming together to say a massive thank you to volunteers for Volunteers' Week from 1-7 June. An estimated **26,000 people** volunteered for netball in this country in 2019, giving the equivalent of £55m of skilled time annually to the game.

To help say thank you, the Netball Family took things online again through a bespoke campaign where they were able to share a sentence about, and show appreciation for, a volunteer (or volunteers) they know. It was a chance for us to celebrate the contributions of the wonderful netball volunteers, who at that time were also putting considerable time into helping the nation through the pandemic.

The Netball Family showed real support of this campaign with content reaching a combined social engagement of 175,000.

PLANNING A **COMEBACK**

As summer began, we started to see a glimmer of normality returning in England. From 1 June schools started reopening, shortly followed in July by non-essential shops, pubs, restaurants and other businesses opening their doors. However, for a period there was still uncertainty about what this meant for sport.



RETURN TO PLAY

Some community sports were given the green light from the Government to return towards the end of July, such as cricket, which could be played socially distanced in its original form. However, as a close contact sport, largely played indoors, a great deal of research and testing was required to develop modifications to standard netball rules in order to reduce the duration of close contact between players, as per Government requirements. All our findings and suggested modifications were submitted to Government in the form of a detailed action plan and then it became a waiting game to receive approval to be able to return netball.

• BLENDED NETBALL

As part of Youth Sport Trust's National School Sports Week, we launched Blended Netball. Blended Netball is a new secondary school peer-to-peer offer, which, along with providing pupils with special educational needs (SEN) a new sport, gives the opportunity for mainstream girls to develop important life skills such as leadership, communication and empathy.

The programme was extensively tested in London thanks to funding through the TeamUp project, designed to support the legacy of the Netball World Cup 2019. Initial plans were to roll the programme out across the country after the 2020 Easter holidays but this was delayed due to the global pandemic.

However, over the summer we developed several webinars for teachers to learn about the programme so that they could see how they could embed Blended Netball into the new school year. 599 teachers and deliverers signed up to learn more and over 100 schools registered to introduce it into their school.

Whilst there have been more delays than we had hoped to get it up and running, the response to this programme has been phenomenal and we can't wait to see how schools and participants embrace it once it is in full flow.

Whilst the Netball Family waited with bated breath for news that netball could return, this provided a great opportunity to remember the journey the sport is on and we looked back on the anniversary of the Vitality Netball World Cup 2019 in Liverpool. One year on saw the release of an impact report which celebrated the achievements of this iconic event, where the world's best teams battled for glory in Liverpool back in July 2019 and provided motivation to regain that momentum once netball could return.

#RISEAGAIN

After taking time to reflect, attention returned to the future of our sport with the new membership window looming. With netball still not back in action, it was clear that retaining members for the 2020/21 season was vital for the sports short term and longterm prosperity. As a not-for-profit organisation, membership is vital to the continued running and development of our sport. Without this, much of the good work undertaken at all levels of the sport would not be able to continue. Retaining our membership however was not only of financial importance, throughout the pandemic it was well documented that female activity levels were disproportionately impacted and keeping the vital connection with our members would be paramount for helping the Netball hoped for and without our members Family return to the sport when ready.

We know the Netball Family are passionate. supportive and determined, and in this year like no other we had to call on them to stand behind our sport despite the uncertainty of when we'd be back or how much opportunity there would be to play. We asked the public to help netball #RiseAgain by committing to their membership for the 2020/21 season.

We recognised that some members of the Netball Family would have also suffered financial hardship, so for that reason, we offered an optional 30% discount. However, for those that chose to pay the full price of membership by the end of September, we pledged to put their names on court at the next international series as a thank you for their support.

The #RiseAgain campaign was accompanied by an emotive video and we asked our volunteers to support us in sharing our plea far and wide. We were overwhelmed with the response. Our regions,

counties, clubs and registered leagues helped to amplify the message and, in some cases, offered further support themselves to members. Our Vitality Roses showed their support on social media, and we also enjoyed some great media coverage. As a result, we had a whopping 79,000 plus members sign up for a 2020/21 membership during the period of this report, which is almost 75% of what we achieved the previous season, and 64% of members paid their full membership fee in support of the sport. It was more than we could have and volunteers' continued dedication and loyalty, the sport would not have achieved the success it has since.

The Lancashire County Netball Association agreed to remove the County fee for adult members and retain the junior membership fee but donate this back to England Netball. The committee was conscious of the financial hardship COVID-19 had on members and introduced membership giveaways, providing an opportunity for Lancashire members to win back the cost of their membership. In addition, the committee has worked with 4 leagues throughout lockdown to successfully convert them to member leagues allowing them to have full access to all England Netball support and protocols, providing a safe environment for members to play.

NETBALL ROADMAP

Towards the end of August, the longed-for news that grassroots netball could return was confirmed by the Government provided the new game modifications were put in place. The challenge now was ensuring all volunteers, staff, coaches, officials, and players understood the rule changes and what protocols had to be followed to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

A detailed Care Package outlining the stages of netball's return and everything volunteers needed to know was launched, we held club and league forums to answer questions in person and published detailed communications to all the Netball Family, so they were prepared for what to expect. The guidance was extensive with test and trace planning in place, risk

assessment documents created, and the introduction of a COVID-19 Officer role which had 900 people step forward to support netball's return in the first month, which later grew to over 2,500.

To support these roles and the wider volunteer network and following the success of region and county forums held throughout the summer, we introduced club and league forums and weekly communication to support our 7,000 volunteers, including all the COVID-19 Officers, to apply the restart guidance to their local organisations.

Adapting to the COVID-19 mitigation requirements was not the only challenge clubs and leagues faced,

another obstacle was accessing facilities. Leisure providers had been hard hit with some not surviving the pandemic and many school facilities weren't available as they focused on trying to return children safely to classrooms. As a result, there was limited access to indoor venues at this time and a lack of outdoor netball courts across the country.

During the summer we slowly progressed through the stages of return with individuals firstly being able to take part in socially distanced netball activity in small groups, then we saw the return of training and had hope for competition being able to restart for the new season.







NAVIGATING THE TIERS

The hope of the return of competition was dampened when in mid-September the Prime Minister announced new restrictions in England, this included the rule of six which once again affected our plans to return the game. At the start of October, a new three-tier system began in England, which effected what level of the game participants could play depending on their location. A few regions were able to still deliver some form of netball activity, whilst others were facing a complete lockdown.



RETURNING IN TIERS

Despite yet again being faced with more challenges caused by the pandemic, our volunteers worked tirelessly to keep members connected to the game and up to date as to what these tiers meant for them. It was a difficult time as the challenges and restrictions varied across different parts of the country. The guidance and care packages were altered to factor various implications, more online club and league forums were held to continue to support people with navigating through this time as best as we possibly could and detailed which tier each region sat in and what that meant for netball in their area.

With netball's full return still uncertain, access to the 30% discount on membership, which was due to end on 30 September 2021 was extended, so that people could still be a part of helping our sport to #RiseAgain for a lower fee. All members signing up before the end of October 2020 could also benefit from 15% off the England Netball Store in recognition of their continued support.




• #TOGETHERWEARENETBALL

During this period, all the home nations joined forces to help protect netball's future. The governing bodies for netball in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales launched a joint initiative called #TogetherWeAreNetball aimed at protecting the sport's longevity and getting women and girls across the UK active again.

As part of this joint initiative, we shined the light on some worrying statistics based on women's activity levels which were affected due to COVID-19. With only 25% of women meeting weekly activity guidelines of 150 minutes per week according to a survey conducted on behalf of Sport England, and 39% concerned that losing their fitness would have a long-term impact according to a Women in Sport report, we knew we had to raise these concerns and do more as a female dominated sport.

As part of this campaign, all four countries asked people to join the conversation, to continue to get behind netball and each made a huge effort to do everything possible to get people active despite not being able to return to courts at that time. England Netball specifically did this by continuing to provide and enhance our Virtual Netball Club offering.





LEVEL 3 COACHING COURSE

We had originally planned to start our Level 3 coaching course in July 2020 but as this course was due to be delivered on a face-to-face basis this was not possible. Therefore, the opportunity was taken to review the Level 3 course content to allow delivery of it in a blended fashion. Consequently, the first weekend of the course was hosted virtually in September 2020.
















ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

With mass gatherings not permitted, England Netball like many regions, counties, clubs and leagues had to rethink our approach to the Annual General Meeting (AGM). To ensure that voting members could still engage with the meeting and cast their votes, a virtual member meeting was hosted to celebrate the amazing successes of the prior year and group members were asked to submit their votes on resolutions in advance of the AGM. We had to conduct the AGM behind closed doors but for the first time streamed the proceedings so members could still watch.

> The AGM saw us announce the appointment of Joan Mills MBE as the new England Netball President. Joan's appointment in this voluntary role came as fellow England Netball Honorary Life Member, Lindsay Sartori stepped down from the helm after five successful years.

Throughout the years, Joan has dedicated herself to boosting the sport's growth and profile, something that was recognised in the Queen's 90th Birthday honours in 2016 when she was awarded an MBE for her services to the game.

Upon her appointment Joan commented: "I am passionate about the sport of netball and want to see England be number one in the World, not just in World rankings, but as the number one women's sport in the eyes of the media and general public from participation numbers, volunteering, officiating at all levels from grassroots to top level competition in the Premier League and Vitality Netball Superleague. I have high hopes and ambitions for the sport and am excited to get started in this new role."

BLACK HISTORY MONTH •

Having hosted several 'Here to Listen' forums on the experience of ethnically diverse communities in netball, one emerging and important theme was the need for more representation and celebration of Black people across our organisation at all levels. from grassroots to elite. In October, through Black History Month we took this important month as an opportunity to continue the momentum of the antiracism movement as we are determined that our sport should offer a place of inclusivity, acceptance and belonging.

We celebrated the unique Black contributions from within our Netball Family, sharing video messages and written stories from several Black members, and celebrated what Black History Month means to them and their work within netball. The videos had over 35,000 views across Facebook and Twitter.

Here are the incredible women we highlighted during this time:

HALIMAT ADIO VITALITY ROSE

Halimat Adio of the Roses has three senior caps to her name after competing in Netball Europe in 2019. She has been a Future for two years now and excels as goal keeper for London Pulse in the Vitality Netball Superleague.

"Netball is such a diverse and inclusive sport and Black History Month is meant to be a time where we learn more about our history, and I also think it's important that we celebrate the past, present and future Black athletes of the sport."

JODIE GIBSON COMMONWEALTH GAMES **GOLD MEDALLIST**

Jodie Gibson has been part of the Vitality Roses set up for years now and has 25 caps for her country. She won the Commonwealth Games in 2018 and has been a strong presence in the Vitality Netball Superleague since her debut.

JANET HILLS HEAD COACH

Janet Hills is Head Coach of Swanley Netball Club and also became the first female Chair of the Met Black Police Association (MetBPA).

JEAN HORNSBY FIRST BLACK NETBALL PLAYER TO REPRESENT ENGLAND

Jean Hornsby started playing netball at school and soon became captain of the England U21 side, a title she held for two years before she made history as the first Black netball player to play for the senior international team.

Cherron Inko-Tariah, who is the CEO of The Power of Staff Networks, played netball throughout primary and secondary school before discovering Back to Netball as an adult.

JENNY THOMAS **WALKING NETBALL HOST**

Jenny Thomas first started playing netball in primary school and is now a Walking Netball Host. She still regularly plays as a goal keeper and watches the sport on TV.
















CADBURY NETBALL SERIES

Due to the players still working through their return to play schedule set out by the Government prior to the tournament, there were many challenges to overcome with tight COVID-19 protocols in place, which included isolating in a hotel in New Zealand for 14 days prior to competition, consuming all meals in individual bedrooms, regular testing on site and training in small bubbles before being able to get on court for the series. After a four-week halt to the game, the Government announced the return of the tier system on 2 December and the process of unlocking netball began once more.

NIKE KIT LAUNCH

At the beginning of 2021, with the support of Sport England, the England Netball Board completed a thorough recruitment process for a new Non-Executive Director to provide added support in the area of equality, diversity and inclusion.

We were delighted off the back of this to announce the appointment of Jennifer Thomas; a former England 400m hurdler and co-founder of Black Inclusion Week, to take on the new role. She quickly became involved in supporting England

Netball's inclusion projects bringing her wealth of experience from both a sporting and corporate background.

One element of the work in this area included identifying opportunities to support the development of England Netball staff. In January as part of National Mentoring Month, England Netball confirmed the launch of a new mentoring programme in collaboration with UK Athletics. For this new partnership

UK Athletics senior managers will act as mentors to employees from England Netball. The 12-month programme, which commenced in February, has so far been very well received.

"I've always loved netball, and I believe it can be accessible to so many people from any demographic background, ensuring it is as inclusive and open to all. I want to help represent the voices of those who may feel they are not always heard in the community and help England Netball to expand its reach even further into these communities."

VITALITY NETBALL LEGENDS SERIES

When we would all usually be planning our New Year's resolutions in January, preparing to get back into training and work after a Christmas break with loved ones, we instead faced a third Government imposed lockdown.

led by Manchester Thunder's Head Coach Karen Greig, that had only played together for three days prior to the games starting.

Whilst we were able to enjoy some jam-packed netball action back on our screens, this event also looked to celebrate the support of our Netball Family. On the court, 41,598 member names were displayed to thank those who paid their full membership fee in 2020 despite the impact of COVID-19 and a social media name hunt ensued. Off the back of this, England Netball were then able to develop the revised Spring 2021 Roadmap for Netball.




VITALITY NETBALL SUPERLEAGUE 2021

The build-up to the Vitality Netball Superleague 2021 season started back in August with the announcement of the player signing window. From 19 August to 30 October 2020 all 11 franchises, including newcomers Leeds Rhinos, began revealing their squads for the 2021 season.


Up until Deadline Day, fans we surprised with some eye-catching moves between clubs. Leeds Rhinos set the benchmark by naming England's most capped player, Jade Clarke, as their first club signing, Saracens Mavericks introduced Commonwealth Games gold medallist Jodie Gibson into their ranks and Team Bath welcomed back Layla Guscoth following a two-year stint in the Suncorp Super Netball League.

It was the most exciting and debated signing window to date, with 1.6 million tweet impressions and 15,400 clicks from August 19 to October 30 and exciting coverage from the likes of Sky Sports, BBC Sport and the Telegraph to name a few, but the only worry lingering in the back of everyone's minds, with COVID-19 continuing to hinder events across the whole sporting landscape, was whether the 2021 season would be able to take place.



Despite concerns, alongside the Vitality Netball Superleague Board, we persevered and planned for all scenarios and successfully bid to the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) as one of 11 sports to receive £4.2 million funding as part of the Winter Survival Fund to support the hosting of the season and sustainability of the Vitality Netball Superleague clubs. Thanks to this funding in the first week of February, the return of the league was announced, accompanied by the news of a new multi-year broadcast partnership with Sky Sports, which was the largest media partnership in England Netball's history. This meant that although fans could not attend, every match of the 2021 season would be broadcast live across Sky Sports platforms.

The new agreement meant the competition had its greatest visibility to date, which was a huge success given that the Vitality Netball Superleague looked different than any year prior due to the pandemic.

In the lead up to the start of the season England Netball launched the Rise. As One. Campaign which captured the unique spirit of the Netball Family as we looked to restart and rebuild the elite competition in this country. It was not just the players that would help us do this - every single member of the Netball Family played their part. From player, to coach, to physio, volunteers and officials, to partners, broadcasters, media and of course fans, coupled with the relentless efforts of staff behind the scenes at England Netball and the Vitality Netball Superleague clubs. Everyone did their bit in starting and delivering the league in this challenging season, and together we were able to Rise. As One.

To abide by COVID-19 restrictions and ensure the safety of all involved in the league, the 2021 season had to be run very differently from the usual home and away format. This included hosting all games from two centralised venues; Studio 001 in Wakefield for the first part of the season covered by the period of this report and then following this the competition relocated to finish out the season at the Copper Box Arena in London. The event set up involved the removal of fans, a rigorous testing process for all players, staff, umpires and others facilitating the games, onsite doctors on hand always, strict isolating, and social distancing rules off the court for all players, plus more. It was not easy but thanks to everyone's dedication and commitment the league got off to an exciting first half.


time in their team's history.

RETURN TO PLAY ROADMAP

Following the Governments roadmap to lift lockdown being published the revised Spring 2021 Roadmap for netball was released. This roadmap ran all the way through to the removal of the game modifications and the return of tournaments, which we hoped would be achieve before the start of the 2021/22 season.

Step 1 began with netball resuming in schools and as part of this we hosted several 'Return to Play' forums for COVID-19 Officers to attend and updated the Care Package to help clubs return and tackle any ongoing challenges, such as accessing facilities.

The response from volunteers, clubs, leagues, and the wider Netball Family following publishing of the roadmap was extremely positive and supportive. Whilst everyone had been itching to get back on court, we couldn't thank everyone enough for their continued dedication and patience as we navigated through each stage of the roadmap with minimal notice of the details from Government at each stage before it was unlocked.





• DYNAMIK

England Netball partners also looked to play their part, DYNAMIK as the official sports flooring partner to England Netball wanted to do their bit to help clubs return after a tough year. They kindly pledged to support one lucky England Netball member club with a £500 grant as part of a fun online competition.

The competition had more than 200 entries, which saw England Netball members post on social media details of how their club had done their bit during COVID-19 and should therefore, in their opinion, win the grant. The winner of the prestigious grant was Grangetown Netball Club from the North East. The club was chosen because of their fantastic efforts in keeping members active throughout 2020, be it raising money for charity, home training programmes, cake bakes and quizzes plus so much more. Their story of togetherness was inspiring and the club received a great injection of additional funding to be able to help them in their return to court.



Grangetown's numerous quizzes, home workouts, bake sales and other fun activities caught the eye of the judges at DYNAMIK and helped them win the much-coveted grant

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
VIRTUAL NETBALL CLUB UPDATES

Whilst we waited for the Government to confirm progression through each stage of the roadmap, towards the end of February some of the Virtual Netball Club (VNC) content was released to the wider public to provide a taste of the benefits on offer as part of England Netball membership. With a glimmer of light that grassroots netball would reopen at the end of March the VNC looked to prepare the Netball Family to be court ready, providing twice weekly 'Netball Lives' for adults and children - with coaches and Vitality Roses players putting participants through their paces, and over 6,000 people taking part. 'Coaches Corner' content was made available weekly to refresh skills for the coaching community, including sessions with Jess Thirlby and Vitality Roses physio Julie Snow.

'Netball Natter' online get-togethers for the community to talk about important topics were held throughout the year. A 'Build Your Happy' session was designed specifically to inspire better mental mindset at a time when we really needed support with Beth Cobden, George Fisher and Rachel Dunn talking to Maimee Morris (the Roses Performance Lifestyle Advisor) and Sarah Ellis (the brilliant career coach, author of 'Squiggly Career', podcast founder of 'Amazing If'). These guests helped to motivate hundreds of the Netball Family as we looked ahead to restarting our game and getting back out there.

'The Huddle' was introduced to the VNC - a place for members to celebrate those who truly stepped up and kept the game and the Netball Family together during this time. To shine a spotlight on those going above and beyond for the sport and tell their story to inspire others.

Throughout the year the VNC was accessed and enjoyed by 32,000 of our community, offering online inspiration and a connection to the game whilst the courts were













LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT


During the pandemic we had been unable to deliver any coaching and officiating learning offers in person. There was high demand to continue to access these learning offers so behind the scenes we started adapting these offers to be delivered in a blended or virtual format. A new virtual Game Sense workshop was launched in August.

In February we launched a new online booking process for the first of our courses adapted to be delivered virtually, which was the England Netball Level 1 coaching course. Within hours of going on sale all places on the 18 courses (360 learners) had sold out and there was still more demand. All members were given access to a priority window to book on as another way to thank them for purchasing their 2020/21 membership.

Due to the growing demand, further courses were quickly arranged whilst also preparing to launch the England Netball blended Level 2 course and the Into Officiating course. Each time courses were made available the bookings flooded in, demonstrating the appetite from the Netball Family to supercharge their development and give back to their sport. It was so promising to see the desire to get involved and play a part when netball was able to return.

In addition to the formal qualification style learning and in recognition that many of our brilliant Walking Netball Hosts in particular shared their nervousness around returning to court, a series of six virtual 'Confidence to Court' sessions specifically for Walking Netball Hosts were delivered so that they could support Walking Netballers up and down the country to return to court when restrictions allowed.

Despite being unable to deliver learning offers 177 Level 1 and 233 Level 2 learners completed their outstanding portfolio tasks and achieved certification.



TOGETHER AGAIN

In March, we began to see the first stage of the Government's roadmap unlocking with primary and secondary schools reopening. In line with this, netball was able to return in schools to much excitement on 8 March and then adult netballers didn't have long to wait until organised community netball activity could resume too.



RETURN TO PLAY

On 29 March, netballers across the country celebrated their return. Hundreds of clubs returned to outdoor training immediately with many more following during early stages of April and this was all made possible by the thousands of volunteers who helped our game get back up and running and our 2,500 COVID-19 Officers.

FINANCIAL REVIEW



This year there was no requirement to prepare consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021 as the business of the Netball World Cup 2019 subsidiary has been concluded and that company is now subject to a Members Voluntary Liquidation.

Sadly, the 2020-21 financial year was largely subject to government-imposed restrictions and national lockdowns, due to COVID-19, which had a significant impact on the netball activity both on and off court. Despite the challenges and thanks to the rallying of partners, volunteers, staff and the broader netball family the business demonstrated strong resilience and there are still many achievements to celebrate from across the last 12 months.

Fantastic support was received from Sport England, our partners and sponsors to allow netball to remain visible and assist the nation in remaining active throughout the year.

Early in the year grant funding from Sport England was confirmed for both 2020-21 and the following year (2021-22) enabling us to develop robust plans to protect our core activities during periods of enforced closure. Successful bids for additional funds followed (Sport England continuity funding - £1.1m and Sport Winter Survival Package funding from government - £2.8m) both protecting jobs and unlocking the opportunity to reactivate activity at all levels of the game.

The support from partners was matched by amazing loyalty from the England Netball membership through the Rise Again campaign. A significant proportion of last year's members renewed to protect their sport at a time where netball activity could not be delivered. Although the drop in membership represented a reduction of £1m in revenues across 2020-21 (£600k) and 2021-22 (£400k), it still represents an excellent result in the current climate.

New sponsorship agreements have also been confirmed with Perform Better, HyperIce and Physique Management during the year to add to the exciting partnerships already established with Vitality, Nike, Jaffa Fruit and Red Bull who have all continued their commitment.

England Netball had a turbulent year but came through without requiring any major financial support from our reserves to sustain the organisation. At the start of the year this scenario looked highly unlikely. However, due to strict expenditure controls being put in place, staff furloughed where possible and necessary and the additional funding secured in the year, a significant deficit was avoided.

"To say I am proud of what we have achieved this year would be an understatement. I would like to thank all those involved in Netball from staff to members to volunteers and everyone in between. We have shown that we can all pull together in the face of adversity and achieve great things."



ICOMF

Income for the year was £8.7 million compared to the previous year of £11.5 million, a decrease of £2.8m (-24%). This decrease was mainly attributable to decreases in ticket sales at events (£1.5m), decrease in membership renewals (£0.6m) and the limited delivery of grassroots programmes (£0.7m) all due to COVID-19 restrictions.

NON-GRANT INCOME



FXPFNDITURF

Total expenditure for the year was £8.7m, a decrease of £2.6m (-23%) compared to the previous year (£11.3m), reflecting the fact that netball delivery was curtailed throughout the year.

Delivery expenditure has decreased £1.9m with the largest decrease being grassroots netball (£1.4m). Staff costs are also lower due to a recruitment freeze and employees being furloughed when and where we were able to.

The next year will be a year of building back stronger in terms, of our game, our sport and our financial strength.

BALANCE SHEET

At the end of the year England Netball maintain a healthy cash position (2021: £6.3m and 2020: £5.0m) due largely to the advanced receipt of grant funding. The general reserve position has decreased by £16k.
