Quarter-finals Notes

- The clubs that have reached the semi-finals are all former tournament winners and have a total of 13 European titles between them.
- The last time there were two away wins at the quarter-finals stage was seven seasons ago in 2012.
- The 124,147 aggregate attendance for the quarter-final matches was up by 10% on last season and was also the highest since the 2011/12 season.
- Holders, Leinster Rugby, are through to the semi-finals for the 11th time.
- Four-time tournament winners, Toulouse, have reached the semi-finals for the first time since 2011.
- All three of Europe's top professional leagues the Gallagher Premiership, the Guinness PRO14 and the TOP 14 – are represented in the semi-finals.
- Following his double against Glasgow, David Strettle now has 19 tournament tries to his name (Saracens 13, ASM Clermont Auvergne 5, Harlequins 1).
- Munster Rugby's victory at BT Murrayfield was a tournament record 14th quarter-final win.
- Of the 15 tournament semi-finals to date between TOP 14 clubs and Irish clubs, France lead the way with 10 wins to five.
- Toulouse's Maxime Médard scored his 23rd tournament try in the dramatic win over Racing 92. He's now in third place on the club's all-time list behind Vincent Clerc (36) and Michel Marfaing (24).
- Munster's CJ Stander has made the most tackles to date with 112.
- Leinster's James Ryan made a quarter-finals stage high of 27 tackles.
- The elusive Cheslin Kolbe of Toulouse has beaten 45 defenders.
- George Kruis of Saracens has won the most line outs with 31, level with Edinburgh Rugby's Grant Gilchrist.
- Keith Earls' two tries against Edinburgh brings his career total for the tournament to 17.
- The match total of 10 tries in Saracens' win over Glasgow Warriors equalled the record for a quarter-final established by Stade Francais Paris and Pontypridd in the 1998/99 season.
- Saracens have scored an impressive 30 tries, one ahead of Leinster, in their seven games to date this season.
- Toulouse lead the way in the offloading stakes with 105 so far this season.

Reaction

"There were fine margins. In the big moments, you have to take your chances and be composed. We probably played more rugby than they did. We had opportunities in the first half to take points but our kickers weren't comfortable, so we went to the corners, we had opportunities. You can't give a silly penalty away, you can't be off your feet on their goal-line and they poach the ball. All those tiny, tiny little bits. You have to learn, and you only learn by doing it. No team develops from where we've come in two years to be the best in Europe or the Pro14. It takes time. We're building, we have a plan, every year we've got to get better. And we need to start to join all that together in terms of the league, Europe and compete on two fronts better. We're a good team, we've done some great things but we just need to do it better."

"Very proud. It took every bit of us, it's a quality Edinburgh side. They can probably count themselves unlucky, they played a lot of the rugby. We defended well. Small margins, small moments decided the game. We're very happy to come away with the win."

"Alex Goode came in at fly-half and did a magnificent job. David Strettle did a great job off the bench. Liam Williams was great at full-back. Alex hadn't trained at fly-half all week, although he has played there for the last four weeks. To play with the control he did was outstanding. To beat a team by that many points in a European quarter-final says you're not a bad team. If you take away the first and last minute, they don't have many points at all."

"That was hugely disappointing. We got a hiding from a team that choked us. They kept down our end and forced a lot of errors from us. You can't put in a performance like that against Saracens and hope to get a result."

"It was an amazing occasion. We are very thankful but in terms of performance we are a long way off our best. Integrating players back in, we looked like a team that have not played together in a long time. We were pretty disappointed by the way we went. We were edgy from the start. We were charged down in the first few minutes, we rode our luck at times and feel fortunate to advance to the semi-finals."

"Look, we knew the size of the task in front of us. It was going to be the toughest of tough tests. They are not double winners for nothing. We had it there for us and they snatched it away.
