1. General

1.1 Introduction

The European Rowing Championships were staged almost annually from 1893 to 1973. Reintroduced into the international rowing calendar in 2007, this is the ninth year of the reinstated version. Originally held at the end of the season, the championships were moved to this early season May spot and since then they have become an essential regatta for European rowing nations.

These championships are open to the 43 European national rowing federations, including Israel. The programme consists of the 14 Olympic boat classes plus three International boat classes (lightweight men's and women's single sculls and lightweight men's pair).

In 2014, 36 nations took part with 649 athletes. Out of those nations, 20 made it to the medals podium. Great Britain topped the rankings in terms of number of gold medals won (two out of eight medals). Germany took ten medals, including one gold. The Netherlands came third with six medals.

This regatta has proved to be a good indication of the crews that will perform well at the season-ending World Rowing Championships. In 2014, of the crews that became European Champions in Olympic boat classes, five went on to become World Champions and an additional three took lesser medals at the World Championships.

Among the European Champions turned World Champions is Denmark's lightweight men's four. They took the European and world titles two years running, in 2013 and 2014. Ondrej Synek from the Czech Republic did the same in the men's single sculls, with two years of back to back European and World Championship golds.

In 2014, Great Britain sent the same line-up in the men's four to the European and the World Championships, winning gold twice, as did Ukraine in the men's quadruple sculls. Great Britain also took the European and World titles in the women's pair.

This year's host nation, Poland will notably be cheering for its women's double sculls and men's eight crews. Magdalena Fularczyk and Natalia Madaj, who won the first World Rowing Cup earlier this month in the double, will aim and defend their 2014 European Championship title. The Polish men's eight, World bronze medallists last year, will also do everything within their power to make their home crowd proud.

In the women's eight, Romania has been the most successful nation at the European level and will once again aim for nothing less than gold. In the men's eight, a showdown can be expected between Great Britain and Germany with Poland also in the mix.

This will be the third time overall that the European Rowing Championships will take place in Poznan. It has previously been held there in 1958 and 2007. Poznan can take pride in its great rowing venue. Set in the midst of an active leisure area, the Malta regatta course offers excellent facilities for teams and spectators. In the past ten years, it has hosted a number of other international events including World Rowing Cup regattas and the World Rowing Championships. Surrounding the venue are various recreational installations making it a favoured outdoor spot for locals year-round.

1.2 European Rowing Management Board

Strong support by national rowing federations in Europe saw the re-introduction of the European Rowing Championships in 2007. This brought back to life the oldest European Championship among all sports (first held in 1893).

To monitor and manage the staging of the European Championships, the European Rowing Management Board (ERMB) was created and it is now made up of four elected members and three members appointed by the World Rowing Federation, FISA Council. This composition has remained stable since 2007.

Staged annually since 2007 (the inaugural event was hosted by Poznan), the European Rowing Championships experienced steady growth followed by a breakthrough. In 2013 the championships were moved from the late season spot of September to the end of May. Fitting in with the World Rowing Cup season turned out to be the right move for the European Championships and the number of participating nations and athletes rapidly increased with media interest following course. In 2014 the championships attracted 649 athletes and 36 nations.

In 2008 the ERMB introduced the European Rowing Junior Championships which has also seen a steady participation increase. Last year in Hazewinkel, Belgium 449 athletes from 31 nations participated. The European Indoor Rowing Championships has now been established in cooperation with Concept2 and the potential is already evident.

Future plans include the introduction of the European Rowing Under 23 Championships in 2017 and being part of the inaugural European Sports Championships in 2018. The ERMB is also reviewing the possibility of including rowing events in the next edition of the European Games and remaining active in the European sports scene to help promote rowing in all of its forms within Europe.

1.3 Rowing in Poland

Poznan is one of Poland's oldest cities and is the capital of the Greater Poland region. Located in western Poland, its population today is around 550,000 inhabitants. After Warsaw, Poznan is the second most prosperous city in Poland. Many international companies have offices based there and the city has one of the highest employment rates nationwide.

Situated in the centre of Poznan, Lake Malta was created as a result of the damming of Cybina River in 1952. It is a major rowing venue for local, national and international regattas. More recently, it has hosted a World Rowing Cup in 2004, the 2007 European Rowing Championships and the 2009 World Rowing Championships. It also staged the ICF Canoe Sprint World Championships in 1990, 2001 and 2010.

When the national rowing federation of Poland was established in 1919, rowing had already been known in the country for a number of years. It was one of the first sports federations to be created after World War I. In the city of Poznan, the first rowing club dates back to 1904 and was initiated by Maciej Wierzbinski, a Polish man who had settled in the city after a long-term stay in England.

The rowing association of the Greater Poland region, WZTW, was established in 1924. It is made up of seven clubs, of which many have a long history going back to the early 1900s. The main purpose of the WZTW today is to coordinate the activities of the rowing community located within this geographical area and also to co-organise any national or international regattas hosted on Lake Malta. The WZTW can boast a number of members who have medalled internationally in rowing.

Poland competed early on in rowing at the modern Olympic Games. At the 1924 edition, it entered two crews, a single and a four. The first Olympic rowing medal was won four years later at the Amsterdam 1928 Games: a bronze in the men's coxed four. To date, Poland has collected 16 Olympic medals in rowing, with its most recent success being a bronze claimed in the women's double sculls at London 2012. Since 1962, the year of the first World Rowing Championships, Poland has assembled a total of 40 World Championship medals.

Some of the better-known Polish crews in recent years have been Robert Sycz and Tomasz Kucharski in the lightweight men's double sculls - together they won two Olympic gold medals and five World Championship medals in the late 1990s and early 2000s. Between 2005 and 2009, the Polish men's quadruple sculls scored a winning streak including four World Championship golds and one Olympic gold.

In 2009, Julia Michalska and Magdalena Fularczyk were the first Polish women to win a World Championship title in an Olympic boat class, the women's double sculls. Marking a new era in Polish women's rowing, they went on to medal at the Olympic Games. Fularczyk is still gaining success in the double with new partner Natalia Madaj.

1.6 Current season summary

World Rowing Cup I, Bled (SLO)

The first World Rowing Cup of the season was held in Bled, Slovenia three weeks ago. The two-part event included the Bled International Regatta, which took place on Friday 8 May followed by the World Rowing Cup from from 9 to 10 May.

This was the first chance for international crews to see how their 2015 speed was going. Several new boat line-ups were tested and, in some cases, Bled was used as part of the national selection process. This was the case for China and Germany who sent the largest teams to the event and dominated in some of the boat classes. It resulted in the regatta points trophy being shared equally between the two countries.

Germany won four gold medals. These came in the blue riband men's eight race as well as the men's double sculls and men's and women's quadruple sculls. The men's double sculls saw former single sculling champion Marcel Hacker team up successfully with Stephan Krueger. "We are going to the European Championships in this line-up," Hacker said. "We want to compare our speed against the Croatians and the Italians."

However, it was China that won the most number of medals overall. They won gold in both the lightweight women's double sculls and the lightweight men's pair. After qualifying five out of six women's pairs for the final, they won silver and bronze in this event. But it was the Dutch pair of Olivia van Rooijen and Elisabeth Hogerwerf who took gold.

The Dutch grabbed a second gold medal in the lightweight men's double sculls. Twins Tycho and Vincent Muda finally found themselves on the medals podium after managing to hold off Portugal and Poland in a very close race. "It was a hard race as always in the lightweight double. It's the first time of the weekend that I kept my head in the boat and did what Tycho said," said Vincent Muda.

Belarus also won two gold medals, one by 42-year-old Ekaterina Karsten in the women's single sculls. Six-time Olympian, Karsten was expected to compete in the double, but changed at the last minute because her partner was injured. However, the change is expected to be temporary and Karsten will be back in the double for the European Championships. "I am training in the double now, but my partner was injured so I hope we can race the double in Poznan and definitely in Aiguebelette," Karsten said. Belarus was also successful with gold in the men's four.

Poland picked up six medals overall to finish third on the points table. Poland's medals included gold in the women's double sculls following an impressive performance by Magdalena Fularczyk and Natalia Madaj.

Overall 20 nations earned World Cup points.

Following the European Rowing Championships, the next stage of the World Rowing Cup will take place in Varese, Italy from 18-21 June 2015, with the final stage in Lucerne, Switzerland from 10-12 July 2015.

Parking

2.5 Who to watch

Women's Pair (W2-)

Following on from their win at World Rowing Cup I in Bled, the Netherlands pair of Elisabeth Hogerwerf and Olivia van Rooijen are back to win more medals. This is the first season for the Dutch duo in the pair and it looks to be a good switch from last year's competition in the women's quadruple sculls. But Hogerwerf and van Rooijen will be up against the seemingly unbeatable World, European and Olympic Champions, Helen Glover and Heather Stanning of Great Britain.

This is Glover and Stanning's first international race for the 2015 season, but internal team testing has shown they are still fast and after setting a new European Best Time at last year's European Rowing Championships, the British duo have a special connection to this event.

Second last year at the European Rowing Championships, Cristina Grigoras and Laura Oprea of Romania are back together and will be a crew to watch out for as Romania is regularly successful at this regatta.

Toni Seifert and Kristof Wilke of Germany won the Bled International Regatta earlier this month and are part of Germany's very strong men's sweep squad.

The depth of talent continues with Rogier Blink and Mitchel Steenman of the Netherlands racing. They finished second at last year's European Rowing Championships. Then there is the British pairing of James Foad and Matt Langridge who were second at last year's World Rowing Championships and have proved themselves to British selectors to remain together for a second season.

Watch out too for Hungary's Adrian Juhasz and Bela Simon Jr. Juhasz and Simon were second behind France at World Rowing Cup I earlier this month.

Women's Double Sculls (W2x):

The women's double has just got a whole lot more interesting. Belarus's queen of rowing, Ekaterina Karsten is racing with Yuliya Bichyk as Karsten aims for her seventh Olympic Games. Then Poznan will see the return to racing of 2012 Olympic Champion (from the double), Katherine Grainger of Great Britain. Grainger, 39, hasn't raced internationally since her London gold medal performance and this will be her first international race after the post-London break. Grainger is teamed up with Victoria Thornley who raced in the women's single sculls last year.

Belarus and Great Britain will test themselves against medal contenders, Milda Valciukaite and Donata Vistartaite of Lithuania - the 2013 World Champions in this boat class. They will also be up against 2014 silver medallists and winners of World Rowing Cup I, Poland's Magdalena Fularczyk and Natalia Madaj. Never underestimate the home-water advantage as Fularczyk and Madaj aim to continue their season unbeaten.

Keep an eye on Germany and Greece. The Germans finished second at World Rowing Cup I, earlier this month while Greece includes young indoor rowing phenomenon, Sofia Asoumanaki.

Men's Double Sculls (M2x):

The success of the new German double (Marcel Hacker and Stephan Krueger) at World Rowing Cup I in Bled, has seen them remain together for the European Championships. Former single sculler, Hacker had only been teamed up with Krueger for a couple of weeks when they raced in Bled. With more time together it is likely they will only be getting faster.

Hacker and Krueger, however, will be under no illusions that in Poznan they will be up against Martin and Valent Sinkovic of Croatia. The Sinkovic brothers came out of their country's medal-winning quad and into the double last season to win every race they entered and set a new World Best Time along the way. The Sinkovic's will be the ones to beat.

Watch out too for 2013 World Champions, Kjetil Borch and Nils Jakob Hoff of Norway. The duo did not fare well in 2014, but they will be ready to prove themselves again this year. There should also be strong competition coming from Bled silver and bronze medallists, Serbia and the Czech Republic.

Men's Four (M4-):

At last year's European Rowing Championships, Great Britain took gold and set a new European Best Time. This year they have put their top sweep men into the men's eight leaving the door open for some potential challenges for winning gold. The British, however, are always strong in the four and they will be hard to beat.

Germany has taken two members of last year's world silver medal winning men's eight and placed them in a new combination in the men's four, along with two young talents who took silver in the men's four last year at the World Rowing Under 23 Championships. They will no doubt be a force to reckon with in this field.

Strong contenders must be winners of World Rowing Cup I, Belarus. The Belarusian crew proved to be good sprinters in Bled and they will come to Poznan with boosted confidence. They will again face silver and bronze medallists from Bled, Spain and Serbia respectively.

Keep an eye out too for Greece. They are the same crew that raced in the A-final at last year's World Rowing Championships and they have regularly shown their ability to medal.

Women's Single Sculls (W1x):

She has, however, started the 2015 season well with a silver medal from World Rowing Cup I in Bled earlier this month.

Fie Udby Erichsen of Denmark medalled at the 2012 Olympic Games before taking time off to have a baby. She came back in 2014 and made the B-final at the World Rowing Championships. Also coming back in 2015 following injury is Olympian Sanita Puspure of Ireland and 2012 Olympic medallist in the double sculls, Julia Michalska of Poland, in her first international race since the London Olympics.

Men's Single Sculls (M1x):

World and European Champion Ondrej Synek of the Czech Republic is using Poznan to make his 2015 debut appearance. Synek has been racing in the single for a decade now and with two Olympic silver medals he has his sights set on Olympic gold. This has inspired Synek to continually improve and he will be hard to beat.

Out to give Synek a challenge will be a group of regulars in the single. This includes Roel Braas of the Netherlands who has shown inconsistent form but has also shown to have immense power. Lithuania's Mindaugas Griskonis continues to hover around the medals including 2014 European Championship bronze. Norway's Olaf Tufte is still trying to work his way back into medal contention. It has, however, been a long, slow path for the 2008 Olympic Champion.

Look out too for Aleksandar Aleksandrov of Azerbaijan who has a powerful sprint and the ability to medal when he times his race correctly.

Lightweight Women's Double Sculls (LW2x):

Poland's Weronika Deresz took silver at World Rowing Cup I in Bled and now has a new partner for Poznan. Teamed up with Joanna Dorociak, will this be the crew that lights up the home crowd?

To make it to the top of the podium, Poland will have to contend with some relative unknown factors as nations have put together new combinations for Poznan. The name Marie-Louise Draeger is very well-known in Germany with an international career that stretches back to 1999. She has a new partner, under-23 World Champion Fini Sturm. Then there's Olympic Champion in the lightweight double, Katherine Copeland of Great Britain who has been teamed up with new partner Charlotte Taylor who was fourth in the lightweight single at last year's European Rowing Championships.

Watch out too for the return of Denmark's London Olympic duo of Juliane Rasmussen and Anne Lolk Thomsen. Rasmussen and Thomsen were fourth in London and since then Rasmussen has become a mother but still managed to fit in training. Also keep an eye out for Elisabeth Woerner and Maaikje Head of the Netherlands who won bronze at World Rowing Cup I earlier this month.

Lightweight Men's Double Sculls (LM2x):

The three medalling crews from World Rowing Cup I in Bled are back again to continue their 2015 racing season. Tycho and Vincent Muda of the Netherlands were first, Portugal's Pedro Fraga and Nuno Goncalves Coelho were second and Milosz Jankowski and Artur Mikolajczewski of Poland finished third. The finish was close in Bled and with the arrival of a lot more competition in Poznan, just making the final here will be a challenge.

Take the addition of 2013 World Champions, Kristoffer Brun and Are Strandli of Norway. Then there's last year's European Champions, Jeremie Azou and Stany Delayre of France. On top of this there's the ever-strong British boat, this year with the new combination of Richard Chambers and William Fletcher. And making it even tougher is the Greek duo of Spyridon Giannaros and Panagiotis Magdanis who are current World Champions in the lightweight men's quadruple sculls.

Women's Quadruple Sculls (W4x):

Annekatrin Thiele, Carina Baer, Marie-Catherine Arnold and Lisa Schmidla of Germany have started off their 2015 season well with a win at the first World Rowing Cup earlier this month in Bled. The crew have just one change from the 2014 World Champion crew and it is looking like Germany will continue to dominate this boat class.

In Bled, however, the Netherlands showed that they had a very strong sprint and with a faster start, the Dutch will make a strong challenge. Bled silver medallists, Poland will have the home course advantage and they are riding on a wave of strength in Polish women's rowing.

Keep an eye out too for Ukraine. They are the Olympic Champions from London and are rebuilding their crew following post-London retirements.

Parmigiani Spirit Award

This year marks the third year of the Parmigiani Spirit Award. The award is open to university rowers worldwide and is sponsored by Swiss watchmaker, Parmigiani Fleurier. The award is designed to encapsulate rowing's core values - teamwork, fairness, natural, inclusive and enduring - and to recognise the achievements of our next generation of rowers.

In 2014, nominations were received from around the world with Franz Gravenhorst, a PhD student in electrical engineering at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, Switzerland winning the award. A German national rowing team member, Gravenhorst has taken an active part in the organisational side of rowing. He is responsible for weekly rowing courses and instructs at the Zurich Universities Sports Association as well as organising an annual rowing camp which is open to all students in Zurich.

Gravenhorst's PhD is based on two projects. One has the goal to improve the healthcare situation for people with mental illness by developing monitoring technology and the other addresses the development of measurement tools for rowing technique using wireless sensors to track the angles of the rowing oar in combination with the movement of the rower.

The award earns Gravenhorst a hand-crafted Parmigiani Fleurier watch and a custom-built top-of-the-range Filippi eight racing shell for his rowing club. The boat is named 'Parmigiani Spirit 2014.'

A panel of judges including New Zealand's Olympic men's single sculling champion Mahe Drysdale, FISA council representative Lenka Wech, Parmigiani Fleurier CEO Jean-Marc Jacot and FISA President Jean-Christophe Rolland decided the 2014 winner.

The inaugural winner was James Cook, an engineering student from the University College of London, Great Britain. Cook chose for the Filippi eight to go to the women's crew at his club and they promptly started recording impressive results.
