About Rowing



Olympic rowing regatta

Rowing became an Olympic sport in 1896, at the first Olympic Games of the modern era held in Athens, Greece. Rough seas, however, forced the event to be cancelled. Women's events were added to the Olympic programme in 1976 and lightweight events in 1996.

Para rowing first appeared at the Paralympic Games in 2008.



Origin

The boat was human's most significant mode of transport for centuries and the oar is considered to be the most important invention before the wheel.

The first representation of a rowing boat was discovered in Finland and dates back to 5,800 BC.

The earliest regatta was held in 1274 in Venice, Italy, where regattas developed as challenges between gondoliers and boatmen.

The origin of the sport of rowing as we know it today comes from England, where the Oxford versus Cambridge University Boat Race was first held in 1829 on the River Thames.



The boats

Boats, or shells, were traditionally made from wood. Top level boats are now fabricated from composite materials such as carbon fibre and kevlar. There's a small fin fitted beneath the boat for directional stability and a rudder for steering (except some sculling boats).

A white ball (bow ball) is attached to the bow for safety and judging precision of the start and finish of races. Seats are fitted with wheels which roll on runners or tracks.



World Rowing Championships

The first World Rowing Championships was 1962 in Lucerne, Switzerland. It is now the biggest annual World Rowing event. This year it will be held in St Catharines, Canada in August.

Female boat classes were included on the World Championship programme in 1974. Lightweight categories featured from 1985. In 2018 the championship programme became gender equal. Para rowing was added in 2002, originally over 1000m it is now fully integrated at 2000m.



More rowing

World Rowing has grown to include indoor rowing or ergometer rowing with the World Rowing Indoor Rowing Championships first being raced in 2018.

The World Rowing Coastal Championships were first held 2007 and is held annually. This is the rough-water version and is raced on the sea or large lakes. The boats are designed to handle rough water and waves. The World Rowing Beach Sprint Finals is the newest event, added in 2019.



The oars

Oars are hollow to reduce weight, attached to the boat by adjustable outriggers. The size and shape of oars is unrestricted, the average length of a sweep oar is 3.70m and of a scull 2.85m.





About World Rowing (page 1/2)

The World Rowing Federation is the governing body of the sport of rowing. It is empowered by its 159-member National Rowing Federations, the National Olympic Committees and the International Olympic Committee, to govern the sport of rowing.

World Rowing was previously called FISA (from the French, Fédération Internationale des Sociétés d’Aviron) with a full name change to World Rowing coming into effect in 2020.

World Rowing sets the rules and regulations for the practice of the sport in all its forms (elite, para rowing, coastal, masters and aspects of indoor). It organises sanctioned World Rowing events including those for under-19 and under-23s. It provides advice and expertise for the organisation of rowing regattas, events, coaching education, rowing development and other matters relating to the sport and its development.

In 2017 World Rowing, as FISA, celebrated its 125th anniversary. It was founded by representatives from Belgium, France, Italy, Switzerland and Adriatica (now a part of Italy) in Turin, Italy on 25 June 1892. It is the oldest international sports federation in the Olympic movement. World Rowing established its first headquarters in Lausanne, Switzerland in 1922 and, after moving away, it returned to Lausanne in February 1996. Lausanne is the home of the International Olympic Committee.

Introduction

Just a couple of months before the Olympic Games, and now the Paralympic Games, rowers come together at the Lake of the Gods, the Rotsee in Lucerne in the last-ditch effort to make the Games. The Final Olympic & Paralympic Qualification Regatta, known as the last chance regatta, is not for the faint-hearted. It is where dreams are made but, for most, where dreams die.

Unlike the continental qualification regattas, this regatta is open to all nations some coming from as far away as Australia and South Africa. For the Olympic events the top two in the 14 finals are the winners. They qualify for the Games. But unlike those who competed at last year's Olympic qualification regatta, at this regatta whoever races in the boat has to be the same person/people that will race at the Olympics.

These athletes will step out of the boat after the final, travel home, train for less than two months and then head for the Paris Olympic rowing regatta start line. This is no easy feat as it essentially means being at your very best – peaking – twice in an incredibly short space of time.

It doesn't, however, mean that it is all too hard once the Olympic Games get underway.

At the delayed 2021 Final Olympic Qualification Regatta, 12 of the 29 boats that qualified from this final regatta made it through to the finals at Tokyo just nine weeks later. The New Zealand men's eight took a phenomenal gold medal. Denmark's men's pair, the Australian women's quadruple sculls, China's women's eight and the Irish women's four all medalled with bronze. The Russian women's pair won silver.

For the New Zealand men's eight they had travelled to the other side of the world under Covid-19 pandemic conditions to be at the final qualification regatta. They hadn't raced internationally for three years and essentially had no idea where they stood. Just two races later the crew came away as winners and returned to their country to go into Covid-19 Pandemic-induced quarantine. The crew, coach and coxswain spent two weeks living in individual hotel rooms with just a rowing machine for company. They went on to become Olympic Champions in Tokyo.

Leading up to the 2016 Rio Olympics, the Dutch lightweight women's double sculls of Ilse Paulis and Maaïke Head managed a similar feat. After qualifying at the last chance regatta, they went on to win the Olympic final just nine weeks later.

This is the first time para-rowing events have been included in the last chance regatta. Previously held separately in Gavirate, Italy para-rowing has now been combined into the Lucerne regatta.

Para-rowers have five boat classes to contest. The PR1 men's and women's single sculls and the PR3 mixed double sculls both have just one boat qualifying for the Paralympic Games. The PR3 mixed coxed four and the PR2 mixed double sculls have the top two boats qualifying for the Games.

Getting to the Olympic and Paralympic Games takes in a ruthless qualification process. It sees athletes go through a brutal qualification process as only a limited number of athletes can attend the Games. The qualification process began at the 2023 World Rowing Championships. At this regatta 114 Olympic boats qualified and 31 Paralympic boats. Uniquely the boat qualified, rather than the athletes. So if, say, Mexico had earned a spot in the men's double sculls, they could then for Paris choose any of their athletes to fill these two seats.

Following the World Rowing Championships qualification moved to the continents with a limited number of boats able to qualify through the Asia/Oceania, Africa, Americas and European Olympic and Paralympic Qualification Regattas. For quota places obtained at the Continental or Final Qualification regattas, the athletes that qualified the boat(s) at these events had to compete in the same event should they compete at the Olympic or Paralympic Games. These events take(n) place:

Olympic Games

Rowing goes from 27 July – 3 August at the Vaires-sur-Marne Nautical Stadium regatta venue, 30 km outside of Paris. A total of 502 athlete places are allocated to rowing with an equal number of women and men.

Rowing has been part of the Olympic Games since the first modern Olympiad in Athens in 1896. At these Games, however, rowing was cancelled due to the weather. Paris 1900 was thus a first for the Olympic rowing regatta. The regatta took place on the River Seine and is remembered for some crews using children as coxswains. These undocumented contestants are now considered to be the youngest ever Olympic participants.

When Paris hosted the Games 100 years ago rowing was held at the Bassin d'Argenteuil, made famous by Claude Monet's paintings. Seven events were held with Jack Beresford of Great Britain winning the single. This was his second Olympic medal and he would go on to win three more, competing at five Olympic Games.

Olympic rowing remained for men only until 1976 when some women's events were added. The women, however, raced over 1000m and would continue to do so until the distance was extended to the 2000m standard distance in 1988. At the Tokyo Olympics the number of

Paralympic Games

Rowing at the Paralympic Games goes from 30 August – 1 September 2024. It includes, for the first time, the PR3 mixed double sculls taking the number of boat classes to five. This will be the fifth time para rowing has been at the Paralympic Games. It made its debut in 2008. At that point races were over 1000m. At Tokyo the distance changed to 2000m – making it the same distance as its Olympic equivalent.

There is a quota of 104 athlete places (not including coxswains) which means a qualification system is required. Before competing athletes must be internationally classified. Para rowing will take place at the

Vaires-sur-Marne Nautical Stadium.
