



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About Rowing

Olympic Rowing regatta

Rowing became an Olympic sport in 1896, at the first Olympic Games of the modern era held in Athens, Greece. Rough seas, however, forced the event to be cancelled. Women's events were added to the Olympic programme in 1976 and lightweight events in 1996.

Para rowing first appeared at the Paralympic Games in 2008.

World Rowing Championships

The first World Rowing Championships was 1962 in Lucerne, Switzerland. It is now the biggest annual World Rowing event. This year it will be held in St Catharines, Canada in August.

Female boat classes were included on the World Championship programme in 1974. Lightweight categories featured from 1985. In 2018 the championship programme became gender equal. Para rowing was added in 2002, originally over 1000m it is now fully integrated at 2000m.

Origin

The boat was human's most significant mode of transport for centuries and the oar is considered to be the most important invention before the wheel.

The first representation of a rowing boat was discovered in Finland and dates back to 5.800 BC.

The earliest regatta was held in 1274 in Venice, Italy, where regattas developed as challenges between gondoliers and boatmen.

The origin of the sport of rowing as we know it today comes from England, where the Oxford versus Cambridge University Boat Race was first held in 1829 on the River Thames.

The oars

Oars are hollow to reduce weight, attached to the boat by adjustable outriggers. The size and shape of oars is unrestricted, the average length of a sweep oar is 3.70m and of a scull 2.85m.

The boats

Boats, or shells, were traditionally made from wood. Top level boats are now fabricated from composite materials such as carbon fibre and kevlar. There's a small fin fitted beneath the boat for directional stability and a rudder for steering (except some sculling boats).

A white ball (bow ball) is attached to the bow for safety and judging precision of the start and finish of races. Seats are fitted with wheels which roll on runners or tracks.

More Rowing

World Rowing has grown to include indoor rowing or ergometer rowing with the World Rowing Indoor Rowing Championships first being raced in 2018.

The World Rowing Coastal Championships were first held 2007 and is held annually. This is the rough-water version and is raced on the sea or large lakes. The boats are designed to handle rough water and waves. The World Rowing Beach Sprint Finals is the newest event, added in 2019.

About World Rowing

The World Rowing Federation is the governing body of the sport of rowing. It is empowered by its 159-member National Rowing Federations, the National Olympic Committees and the International Olympic Committee, to govern the sport of rowing.

World Rowing was previously called FISA (from the French, Fédération Internationale des Sociétés d'Aviron) with a full name change to World Rowing coming into effect in 2020.

World Rowing sets the rules and regulations for the practice of the sport in all its forms (elite, para rowing, coastal, masters and aspects of indoor). It organises sanctioned World Rowing events including those for under-19 and under-23s. It provides advice and expertise for the organisation of rowing regattas, events, coaching education, rowing development and other matters relating to the sport and its development.

In 2017 World Rowing, as FISA, celebrated its 125th anniversary. It was founded by representatives from Belgium, France, Italy, Switzerland and Adriatica (now a part of Italy) in Turin, Italy on 25 June 1892. It is the oldest international sports federation in the Olympic movement. World Rowing established its first headquarters in Lausanne, Switzerland in 1922 and, after moving away, it returned to Lausanne in February 1996. Lausanne is the home of the International Olympic Committee.

- Sustainability: World Rowing carefully assesses sustainability in all its actions
 and decisions. World Rowing endorses a responsible and sustainable approach
 to the planning and staging of its events so as to maximise positive impacts and
 minimise negative impacts on the environment and surrounding communities.

Melvin Twellaar

Height: 200cm Age: 28

Weight: -

This is Melvin's first time back racing internationally after he crossed the Paris Olympic finish line taking silver in the double sculls. Leading up to Paris, Melvin and partner Stef Broenink had a winning streak beginning in 2023. The Paris silver is Melvin's second Olympic medal with another silver from the double at Tokyo. Melvin is also very handy in the single. He has a silver from the 2022 World Rowing Championships and gold from the 2022 European Rowing Championships.

Melita and Antonia Abraham

Age: 27

Height: 170cm

Weight: 62kg

Melita and Antonia are two parts of rowing's quadruplets. Their two brothers Ignacio and Alfredo also compete at the top level. But it is Melita and Antonia who have really made their mark on the sport. They hit the international scene back in 2014, rowing together in the pair at the World Rowing Junior Championships. They finished fifth and ever since have been collecting top results making them the most successful Chilean women rowers ever. Their first international gold was at the World Rowing Under 23 Championships in 2017 and most recently they competed at the Paris Olympics. The pair has been their main boat but they've dabbled in the double.

Erik Horrie

Age: 45

Height: -

Weight: -

Erik can be considered both a pioneer of para rowing and one of its longest and most consistent competitors. A car accident left Erik a paraplegic and led him to the PR1 men's single sculls. He first competed internationally over a decade ago in 2011 finishing with a bronze medal at that year's World Rowing Championships. He then went on a ten-year para rowing medals spree that saw him on the podium at every international regatta he competed in.

Erik has now been to four Paralympic Games and has three Paralympic silver medals to his name. He was named the World Rowing Para rower of the year in 2014 and has five World Championship titles.

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Mateusz Biskup

Age: 31 Height: 190cm

Weight: 84kg

Mateusz feels very comfortable with an oar in each

hand. The sculler began competing internationally as a junior and then moved up to Poland's senior team and the men's quad. Continual improvement culminated in a fourth-place finish at the Rio Olympic Games. Since then Mateusz has gone between the quad and the double gathering medals along the way.

At the Tokyo Olympics Mateusz raced in the final of the double. He then moved back into the quad and in the years leading up to the Paris Olympics, his crew has medalled in all of their international races., culminating in a third-place finish at Paris. Mateusz finished with gold last month at the 2025 European Championships, back in the double.

Frida Sanggaard Nielsen

Age: 26 Height: - Weight: -

Frida has spent the majority of her rowing career as a sweep rower including two-times competing at the Olympics in the women's four. This year, however, Frida popped up on the start line of the women's single at the European Rowing Championships. She finished a very credible third. This adds another string to Frida's rowing bow which includes racing in the pair and eight for her country.



Varese is located in the Northern part of Italy, 55km north of Milan. The town, of 78,000 inhabitants, lies at the foot of the Campo dei Fiori mountain range overlooking Lake Varese. The Lake is 8.8km long and 4.5km wide. Well-known for its natural beauty, it is protected by Natura 2000, a network of protected areas set up by the European Union to safeguard rare or endangered species and habitats. It is claimed that rowing has been practiced on Lake Varese for over 5000 years.

The Varese Rowing Association was established in 1927 and currently has 13 rowing clubs.

Varese has hosted the Coupe de la Jeunesse in 2007, the 2012 and 2021 European Rowing Championships, the 2013 World Rowing Masters Regatta, the 2014 World Rowing Under 23 Championships, the 2022 combined World Rowing U19 & U23 Championships and World Rowing Cups in 2015, 2016, 2023 and 2024.

The waters of the Rotsee, walking distance to the town of Lucerne, are ideal for competitive rowing. The lake's size and shape enable Olympic-style six-lane racing over 2000 metres. Its geographical position makes the course arguably the fairest in the world. Ask any rower where they love to row and it is often the Rotsee that is mentioned.

The Rotsee is a Nature Reserve with a rich variety of flora and fauna and special permission is needed for any activity in the reserve. The bird life especially is rich with some species hard to find elsewhere in Switzerland. In the winter some 3500 red-headed divers come to stay. On any given day around 60 bird species can be spotted. Its shores are a year-round recreational area for large numbers of local residents.

The Lucerne Regatta Association was formed in 1903 and in 1933 they started to use the Rotsee as a regatta venue. Ever since the World Cup series began in 1997, Lucerne has been regularly on the schedule, usually the final World Cup of the season. It hosted the first World Rowing Championships in 1962 and has hosted many more since.

World Rowing Cup Series

The world Rowing Cup, in its current form, was established in 1997 to give athletes more opportunities for top international racing.

Usually made up of a series of three regattas, for 2025 it is a series of two regattas, held in close succession, to enable nations that must travel a long distance to be able to attend both regattas. They act as a lead-up to the World Rowing Championships. The racing programme includes the 12 Olympic boat classes and a selection of international boat classes. Selected World Cups also include para rowing boat classes.

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Scoring

Each Olympic boat class earns points based on the finishing order. The highest placing boat from a country is awarded the following points:

1 st	8 points
2 nd	6 points
3 rd	5 points
4 th	4 points
5 th	3 points
6 th	2 points
7 th	1 point

If a country has more than one crew in a boat class, points are awarded only to the first crew. The crew with the most points in each boat class is declared the World Rowing Cup leader. After the second World Rowing Cup regatta, the crew with the most points in each boat class is declared the World Cup winner. They receive the World Rowing Cup for the boat class.

Competition schedule

The schedule of racing will be drawn after entries close and a provisional competition schedule can be found on the event page on www.worldrowing.com. Racing usually occurs over three days with the progression going through a new (for 2025) progression system of heats and finals. Quarterfinals and semifinals are added to the pracing progression as required by the number of entries in each boat class.

The final racing draw is made at the Team Managers Meeting which takes place at 3pm on the Thursday before racing starts.



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New Progression System

In Rowing, the progression system is the set of rules that determines how athletes or crews advance through the different rounds of a competition – from heats to finals.

It outlines who qualifies directly to the next round of racing at each stage of the competition, ensuring a fair and structured path towards the medals.

World Rowing has adopted a new progression system based on the following path:

- The first two crews from each heat will progress directly to the next round of racing;
- The remaining places in the next round of racing will be filled with the fastest qualifying times from the heats;
- · Repechages are now eliminated.

Quarterfinals will be held for the top 24 crews and semifinals for the top 12 crews, based on the times achieved in the previous rounds.

This new progression system ensures that performance is rewarded, crews where possible get a minimum of two race opportunities and the competition remains dynamic and engaging for athletes and spectators.
